Board games reinforce critical thinking skills, patience, and strategy. When students engage in this activity, he/she needs to focus, create a plan, and strive for a goal.

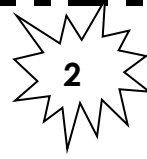


**Asking Questions/

Focus: **While you read, try to form pictures in your mind of the characters and actions.**

Making Connections

Focus: **Use sticky notes as you read to mark your connections (TT, TS, and TW). In particular, try to connect to the feelings and emotions of the characters.**

Respond: **Explain in detail one (1) of your connections.**



Vocabulary

Focus: As you read, identify new words you don't know and write them on sticky notes with the page numbers included.

Respond: Below, list five (5) new words from the book you are reading and their definition as used in the story.
